1. Organizational Profile

Mission

To transform lives and strengthen vulnerable communities through integrated humanitarian assistance, social development, and economic empowerment programs.

3. Programs and Results – 2025

3.1 Comprehensive Care for Older Adults

Objective:

Improve quality of life, food security, and psychosocial well-being of older adults living in vulnerable conditions.

Key Results 2025

- Older adults directly benefited: **18,500**
- Families receiving regular food assistance: **9,200**
- Preventive health and social support interventions: **210 community outreach actions**

Executed Investment: USD 48,000

Observed Impact:

Interventions contributed to improved food security, reduced social isolation, and enhanced physical and emotional well-being among older adult beneficiaries.

3.2 Child Protection, Nutrition, and Education

Objective:

Strengthen the integral development of children in contexts of rural poverty and Indigenous communities.

Key Results 2025

- Children directly benefited: **42,300**
- School kits distributed: **28,700**
- Children supported through nutrition programs: **33,500**
- Safe learning and recreational spaces implemented: **46**

Executed Investment: USD 85,000

Observed Impact:

Improved school attendance, nutritional status, and early cognitive development among participating children.

3.3 Indigenous Community Development (Shipibo and Asháninka)

Objective:

Promote inclusive development while respecting cultural identity and ancestral knowledge.

Key Results 2025

- Indigenous communities served: **37**
- Individuals with improved access to safe water and sanitation: **12,800**
- Families trained in sustainable livelihoods: **2,450**
- Intercultural education initiatives strengthened: **18**

Executed Investment: USD 32,000

Observed Impact:

Enhanced community resilience, improved sanitary conditions, and strengthened local productive capacities.

3.4 Rural and Highland Development**Objective:**

Increase food security and income generation among rural families through sustainable agriculture and access to basic services.

Key Results 2025

- Farming families trained: **6,300**
- Irrigation and sustainable production systems implemented: **124**
- Individuals benefiting from community health services: **14,600**

Target Regions:

Huancavelica, Cajamarca, Huánuco

Executed Investment: USD 15,000

A direct beneficiary is defined as any individual who effectively received goods, services, or training through programs executed during the reporting period.

Data Collection and Validation

- Program administrative records
- Attendance lists and community agreements
- Field team reports
- Quarterly internal consolidation and validation processes

Measurement Period

January – December 2025

This approach ensures data consistency, traceability, and reliability.

11. Strategic Outlook – 2026 and Beyond

ChicasTech – Digital Inclusion and Technological Empowerment (Projected)

Program status: Strategic initiative in design and planning phase, with implementation scheduled from 2026 onward.

Strategic Objective: Reduce the digital and gender gap by strengthening technological skills among adolescent girls transitioning to higher education or the labor market.

Target Population:

- Girls and adolescents aged 15–18 from vulnerable socioeconomic backgrounds

Planned Training Areas

- Advanced digital literacy
- Introduction to artificial intelligence and emerging technologies
- Web and basic application development
- Computational thinking and STEM skills
- Vocational guidance, leadership, and digital employability

Projected Initial Reach (2026–2027)

- Estimated participants per annual cohort: **400–600 adolescents**
- Projected training centers: **5–7**

Strategic Approach:

ChicasTech is conceived as a high-impact social innovation initiative aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs 4, 5, 8, and 9), with strong potential for national scale-up and partnerships with the technology, education, and international cooperation sectors.
